The case for a global treaty on plastic pollution

Plastic pollution is a global, and raising, concern. We have produced more plastic in the last 10 years than in the whole of the 20th century, and every piece of plastic ever produced still exists today. This side event aims to bring together representatives of many UNEA stakeholder groups to provide a better understanding of the challenges of plastic pollution. This includes a focus on the root-causes, true costs, and impacts of plastic pollution on all ecosystems, aquatic and land-based, and throughout the plastic life cycle. Participants will showcase existing policy approaches and examples of people-powered solutions, and explore options for global and multi-stakeholder approaches to address this challenge.

Addressing plastics pollution is highly relevant for achievement of SDGs 6 (Ensure access to water and sanitation for all), 11, (Make cities inclusive, safe, resilient and Sustainable), 12 (Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns), and 14 (Conserve and sustainably use the ocean, seas and marine resources).
